




Macbeth

A play by William Shakespeare (adapted)

Macbeth is one of the shortest plays of William Shakespeare (1564–1616), the famous English playwright who wrote at least 37 plays. Shakespeare was also a poet and actor. Born in Stratford-upon-Avon in Warwickshire, England, he began a successful career in London as an actor, writer and part-owner of a playing company called the Lord Chamberlain's Men, later known as the King's Men, which owned the famous Globe Theatre.

A play in five acts, *Macbeth* is set in the eleventh century in Scotland. It is about a Scottish general who is told by three witches that he would one day be the king of Scotland. Egged on by his ambitious and ruthless wife, Macbeth murders the king to get the throne. Then, haunted by fear and guilt, Macbeth kills more people before he is defeated and killed in a battle.



Cast of characters



Macbeth was a general in the army of Duncan the Meek, King of Scotland. At the beginning of the play, he is on his way back from a battle with his friend and fellow general, Banquo. Macbeth had displayed great valour in the battle.

Lady Macbeth, the ambitious wife of Macbeth, made sure he realised his ambitions and dreams. She encouraged and supported him in all his endeavours.



Weird Sisters

The witches appear in the first scene of the play. Macbeth and Banquo stumble upon them in a heath (an area of open land covered with rough grass). Macbeth calls them the Weird Sisters in a letter to his wife. Later in the play, Macbeth meets them again. On both occasions, the witches make predictions that change the course of the play.



Banquo was the thane of Lochaber. To begin with, he was Macbeth's friend, but their relationship changes as the play progresses.

Macduff was the thane, or lord, of Fife. Macbeth was jealous of him. Macduff decided to support Malcolm, the son of Duncan, in his claim to the throne against Macbeth.



Duncan the Meek reigned as the king of Scotland, and his kinsman (relative) Macbeth was one of his generals. King Duncan's army was engaged in battle with those who had rebelled against him. He was told that Macbeth had defeated the thane of Cawdor and made him prisoner. Macbeth had also saved the life of Prince Malcolm. Meanwhile, Macbeth and the other general, Banquo, were passing through a heath on their way back from the great battle to the royal burgh (town) of Forres. They stopped at the sight of three figures who looked like women but had beards.

Ulysses and Polyphemus

An extract (adapted) from the *Odyssey*, by Homer

Ulysses (or Odysseus) was a legendary hero in Greek mythology. He was king of the island of Ithaca and the main character of Homer's epic poem *Odyssey*. The *Odyssey* is one of the two great works of ancient Greece (the other being the *Iliad*). Believed to have been written by Homer in the 8th century BC, these are among the oldest works of literature still being read.

Ulysses is depicted as a man of outstanding wisdom, cunning, valour and endurance. In the *Iliad*, he played an important role in the long-drawn and bloody Trojan War, one of the best-known tales of Greek mythology. It was Ulysses the warrior and strategist

who enabled the Greeks to capture Troy by means of the wooden horse, famously known as the Trojan horse. The *Odyssey* begins after the Trojan War, and narrates Ulysses' ten-year struggle to recover his kingdom and his home after the war. During this period, he encounters mystical creatures and faces the wrath of gods. In this story, Ulysses finds himself and his men on the shores of an unknown island after his ship is surrounded by fog. He takes a few of his men with him to explore the island, where he encounters Polyphemus, the most famous of the Cyclopes.

The mainland on the shore where they landed was a wild rocky place, and there was a broad road winding away up to the higher pasture lands. The road was made of great rocks beaten into smoothness, and fresh spoor of cattle showed that not long since a great herd had passed to the upland feeding grounds.

Directly in front of them as they landed was a high cave. It was fringed with laurel bushes. Before the cave a great wall had been built in a square, forming a courtyard. The wall was built with enormous masses of rock, and fenced with pine trunks and massive boles of oak. There was no sign of any living thing. Slowly and cautiously, the party crept up to the wall.

Their weapons were in readiness as they stole through the gateway. Within the square formed by the wall they could see that it was a vast cattle pen.

"This must be the dwelling of some giant," said Elpenor; "men do not build like this. On what strange place have we chanced?" He looked inquiringly at Ulysses.

"I think, comrades," said Ulysses, "that we have been driven to the shores of the Cyclopes. They are mighty giants.
