



Lots of animals come from eggs. Some with fins and some with legs.


Some that chatter and some that cheep. Some that fly and some that leap.

Some that slither and some that run. Some with feathers and some with none.




Animal eggs can be quite small. Or just as big as a tennis ball.

"It's time for riding lessons!" announced their older friend Ramachandra Panduranga. The three children jumped onto their favourite ponies.

"When we grow up, we'll ride a horse as big as that one," said Dhondu, pointing to his father's favourite horse. His father was Baji Rao, the peshwa, or ruler.

Do you know who these children were? They grew up to be some of the bravest people of India. They fought to free their motherland from British rule. Dhondu Pant grew up to be a peshwa and fighter, known as Nana Sahib. Ramachandra became a brave warrior, known as Tantia Tope. And Manu? She was one of the bravest women ever in India—Rani Lakshmi Bai, the Rani of Jhansi.

Manu's childhood was different from that of other girls of her time. Her father worked in the court of Baji Rao, the peshwa. So, Manu grew up

with the boys in the peshwa's household. Her friends were
Tantia Tope and Nana Sahib. Manu learnt skills like horse
riding, sword fighting and archery. She also learnt the





Let's make beautiful art with the help of leaves. Here's how you can do it.

- 1. Walk around a place where there are trees and bushes, like your school compound or a nearby park.
- 2. Collect some leaves of different shapes and sizes.
- 3. Place the leaves between the folds of a tissue paper or newspaper. Place the paper between the pages of a large book. Now, put other books on top of it, so that the leaves are pressed.
- 4. After a week, take out the leaves and leave them in the open for some time.
- 5. Now, you can use the leaves to make art as shown below. You can also frame your work of art.

How good are you at listening and speaking? Let's play the game of Chinese whispers (also called telephone) and find out.

- 1. Divide the class into groups of 10 or 12 students. Sit or stand in lines.
- 2. All groups play one by one. The teacher starts the game with one group. She whispers a word, a group of words or a sentence into the ear of one player in the first group.
- 3. The player will whisper the word or words to the person sitting next to him or her. This person whispers to the next person, and so on.
- 4. The whispering will go on till it reaches the last person in the group.
- 5. By the time the original message reaches the last player, it may be something completely different.
- 6. Try whispering these: Five fresh fish in a frying pan, the sixth sick sheep, the clever cat cut the cake, and so on. At the end, everyone will surely have a good laugh!
